## **CCS Falling Leaves Hill Climb 2023**

Cycle Club Sudbury once again held our annual Falling Leaves Hill Climb event on Watson's Hill Semer on Sunday 8th October 2023. Number of riders was down compared to previous years with 33 riders on the start sheet, two of which were junior riders and a further seven juveniles and the youngest being Wilfred Hare just 8 years!

Once again the headquarters was held at Hollow Trees Farm Shop and only a short walk to Watson's hill for the spectators. With the weather being a balmy 24 degrees it felt more like August than October bringing out around one hundred spectators to cheer and ring cow bells to help the riders up the hill and creating a fantastic atmosphere, the event started at 11.01 am and lasted just over 35 minutes.

The overall winner was *Frank Longstaff of Colchester Rovers* in a time of 43.5 seconds and fastest female rider was on form *Millie Jenkins* of Brother UK Team in a time of 59.6 seconds and Millie was also one of the junior riders.

I was on time to start the 1st section being on a very fast busy road with added pot holes. I had farm vehicles spilling straw everywhere to add character to the ride.

There were sections of the course that were well twisty and winding with of course... the hills!

I was thinking I was near the finish but hit a downhill section for which I was unprepared for! The mountain ahead made Cuckoo Hill and Semer's Watson Hill look tiny. I was in the wrong gear and with my dancing legs grumbling I stopped half way up having to run and push to the top.

I did finish last as usual but this was the 'Grand National Champs' and My Final Curtain?

## Open TT Round-Up.....

The list above shows us how much the Open TT rider numbers have fallen again this season. It's not just our club that has suffered, but a general malaise amongst the Open TT riders throughout the land. A lot of theories have been put forward in which I think when they are all considered together (no matter how small) make up the reasons why, with no major contributor being the headline factor. A bit like 'marginal gains' in reverse!

Anyway, our happy band of CCS Open competitors has put on a good show flying the Orange colours of CCS.

Starting at the 'pointy end', we have Alex Purcell who has taken over the mantle of top CCS rider from others who have fallen by the wayside during the last 2-3 seasons.

He certainly is a class act on the TT courses and this season saw him collect 1 x 1<sup>st</sup> overall, 1 x 2<sup>nd</sup>, 1 x 3<sup>rd</sup> and 2 x 4<sup>th</sup> positions. Add to that, he was also in the fastest winning team twice. Simon Daw continues to defy his years with 5 top 10 finishes (3<sup>rd</sup> being his best) and also 2 fastest winning team prizes. It's not often that riders of his age produce new Personal Best rides which he managed in a 25 mile event at the end of the season. He was the only rider to enter the set of standard distances; 100, 50, 25 & 10mile TT's. A very committed rider who always gives it his 'all' and is also ready to help and mentor younger TT'ers who are on the way up.

Someone who has always put in strong rides over the last 2-3 years is Gary Pamment. He has ridden well this year with a 7<sup>th</sup> placing and 4 rides in the top 20. He goes about his Time Trials in a quiet no fuss manner and has reaped the rewards.

One other rider who also consistently comes up with good placings is Nick Webber who also defies his age and has had 2 top 10 rides (4<sup>th</sup> place being his best) and 4 rides under the top 20's. A quick mention of two of our (very) younger riders! Charlie Heeks has again dipped his pedals into Open TT's and performed admirably quickly with a 22.21 for a 10 and hope he continues in this vein next year as he can only go quicker. And another Charlie (Upton) who also tried out an Open 10 at the end of the season and was equally as rapid with a 24.24 which is very promising for one so young.

Our top lady rider is the ever cheerful Sue Triplow who didn't start her campaign until mid May but then managed to ride in 14 events before the season's end. These included two fastest 1<sup>st</sup> ladies prizes and one 3<sup>rd</sup> fastest lady prize alongside a raft of placings in the top 30's and 20's, which considering she was generally riding against men competitors was no mean feat!

Next we have Caroline. No matter where she comes in the event, she always has a good tale to tell, and always with a smile on her face. She doesn't do things by half's and goes off around the country entering Gran Fondo's and National Championships alongside the normal TT events she enters (23 this season!) Not always coming last and picking up a few prizes along the way. She embodies the cycling ethos of 'just enjoy it'.

Well done to all others who rode events this year and hope to see you all in the new season!

### UCI World Gran Fondo Championships

The plan had gradually become more ambitious as the year had progressed. Initially, it was simply to repeat the trip I'd made to the Isle of Man in 2021 and 22, for the UCI World Series Gran Fondo and Time Trial. For the first time, however, I was now also making it a group visit with Gary &Sarah Johnson and Nick Webber.

Having finished second in my age category in the time trial in 2021, and then having won it the following year, I was looking for an age-category podium at the very least, and ideally a repeat win. The Fondo was more complex. At my first attempt I'd opted for a social ride with a group of newly made local friends. The following year I'd tried to be more

competitive, but was having a particularly bad fortnight on the downhill's, and ended up having to stop for someone who thought he was a good descender but wasn't, and who managed to break a collar bone (at least) after trying to take the road ahead when the road itself preferred right, resulting in an unplanned visit for him to a rocky mountain stream and subsequently a ride to Nobles Hospital in an ambulance. The delay again cost me any chance of a respectable placing, and I wanted to prove to myself that I could deliver – at least a bit.

I can't remember at what point I started thinking about the World Gran Fondo Championships. For those unfamiliar with how things work, the Isle of Man Gran Fondo events are part of the UCI World Series and finishing in the top 25% of any World Series event – time trial or Fondo – qualifies the rider for the championship. For 2023, all world championship events were to be held in (nearly) the same place and at (nearly) the same time, and that place was to be Scotland, nominally Glasgow, though in practice the events were held in several Scottish cities. As well as the "real" (elite) championships, this included the Gran Fondo events. I've ridden a couple of the time trials in the past, at Hobro in 2015 and Albi in 2017, but although I've qualified several more times I generally haven't attended, due to travel and expense. However, Scotland looked easier, and I have long-separated cousins there. However, the downside was that The Isle of Man events were on the 22<sup>nd</sup> / 23<sup>rd</sup> of July, the Championships the 4<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> of August. This didn't leave much time to enter, never mind plan.



Our group travelled separately, arriving at different times. Gary and Sarah arrived on the Monday, and we then started a programme of steady ("Zone 2") rides to recce some of the main sections of the events, mixed in with a bit of sightseeing, and all timed as far as possible to work around the inevitable rain.

The forecast for the weekend of the 22<sup>nd</sup> / 23<sup>rd</sup> was – to put it mildly – looking imperfect. The one hopeful sign was that Saturday – time trial day - was predicted to be unremittingly wet, whereas Sunday – the Fondo – might

be a bit showery early, and then really quite pleasant later.

Never trust a weather forecaster.

I'd put myself under a lot of pressure for this event – the downside to focussing an entire season on one ride - and had been dreading the possibility of a puncture on roads which might be awash. To everyone's

surprise, though, the weather on the Saturday was actually not too bad – low cloud covering the summit of the mountain, but (more-or-less) dry.

I managed a time of 24:45.38, winning my age category by a little over two-and-a-half minutes, and finishing third overall, only thirty-two seconds behind the (much younger!) winner, Adam Baker. I'd averaged 308 watts – absolutely identical to last year's ride, but my current (much) lighter weight giving me over 5 w/kg for the first time. Of three entrants, Sarah had been the only rider in her category not deterred by the forecast (I presume) and had therefore also won. You have to be there to win!



Even though my time was actually two seconds slower than last year – the headwind - I'd exceeded my expectations by some way by finishing third. It was a massive relief, if I'm honest: a self-imposed weight off of my shoulders. It meant that whatever happened, my cycling season would be one I'd look back on with a smile.

But in the short term, there was still the Gran Fondo the next day, when the weather would be "better". Well, that was the plan. Sunday, however, dawned to low cloud, strong winds and steady, heavy rain. Which wasn't, the forecaster now admitted, going to stop! Gary immediately decided it wasn't for him, and although Sarah initially wanted to give it a go she also had second thoughts on arrival at Mooragh Park,



leaving only Nick (who I didn't actually see all day!) and me. The onshore wind at Ramsey made it hard to stay on the bike whilst warming up along the seafront, and the driving rain, standing water and general filthiness of the day meant that I looked as though I'd already ridden a spring road race in foul conditions after a few minutes of attempting to warm up.

I never saw the front, and to be honest wasn't that worried – I ended up in small groups, where it was probably a bit safer, although someone a few wheels ahead still managed to crash as we circled Jurby airfield at speed. My main goal for the day was to finish with same amount of skin as I started. Conditions which were bad at sea level became considerably worse on the climbs (not to mention the descents), and there was cloud, driving rain, flooding and even a mountain stream which had decided that the road was more attractive than its normal route.

Cold and very wet, it was all a little grim at the finish – no podium presentations (no medals or jerseys had arrived, and in any case the

weather was just, well, uninviting!) and only a sense of camaraderie in adversity, rather than the usual upbeat atmosphere in the park. I'd finished 68<sup>th</sup> overall, out of 245 finishers, and sixth in my age group. Unspectacular, but I'd made it round, and I'd qualified for the World Gran Fondo Championships, as well as for the time trial.

A cousin who lives near Forfar had very kindly offered to put me up for some of the time in Scotland, which made everything both a lot more comfortable and a good deal more enjoyable. Although the level of organisation was pretty poor, the events themselves were superb; with tremendous support from the local authorities, the police, and the public...every village on the 160km of the road race route had a carnival atmosphere, with people lining the streets, pipers, bunting and bells.

The time trial was on a characterless stretch of the dual carriageway A92, but there were still spectators with national flags and shouts of encouragement.

In many respects, the road race course should have suited me, with three main climbs and manageable descents. Well, manageable to most. Setting off in age groups — there were over 180 riders in my 55-59 category — the event covered a 160-km course from Perth city centre to the Highlands, and then back to Scone Palace for the finish.

Unfortunately, my lack of nerve beat me again, and from being uncharacteristically near the front at the



top of the short climb preceding it, I was washed steadily towards the back as we took a descent after 50km (them at 80km/h, me at 60km/h). By just over halfway down, I was out of the back, and by the bottom the commissaire's car had passed me.

I spent the remaining 110km passing groups of riders who'd been spat every time the road went upwards, and riding with groups between the climbs. I finished 71<sup>st</sup> in the end, so at least I was in the right half (by the end...).

And then an attempt to recover in time for the time trial!

The course may have been typically British, but it certainly wasn't an inspired choice. As mentioned before, it used the A92 east of Dundee, the westbound carriageway having been closed to traffic and split into two for the race. This made the roundabouts tighter than usual, and also made for an interesting turn, which used part of one of the junctions. It was tight, though, and being approached slightly downhill and with a tailwind it definitely had the potential for disaster. There were indeed quite a few crashes, possibly caused by one stretch on which there was quite a fresh crosswind.

It wasn't an event that suited me – far, far too flat – but I quite enjoyed it. I struggled to get into any sort of rhythm early on, losing time through the roundabouts and the slightly downhill crosswind section, but in truth it was nothing that made any real difference to the result. I was caught by one, and caught one,

which I regard as evens! I finished 22<sup>nd</sup> out of 35, in a time of 32:18, and an average speed of just over 42.3km/h. Not embarrassing, but not a performance for which I'd have wanted to travel to another continent, so I probably won't be riding many more of these (unless someone organises a final on a hill that's equivalent to Snaefell...!). The next day I was homeward bound, twenty-four days after setting off on what had proved to be quite an adventure. For me, cycling is a way to give focus to travel.

SPORTGERA COM

Most of the events I ride are fairly unimaginative –

nowadays, just traditional British time trials. Same courses, same riders, same village halls. These events are very different, and have given me an opportunity to target something I think is worthwhile.
